Course Summary:

Beginning with an examination of the nature of government according to God's Word, this semester-long course (to be followed by Economics) explores how the American people govern themselves at national, state, and local levels. Special emphasis will consistently be placed on developing skills for informed, responsible, effective citizenship. As such, students will take part in hands-on projects and activities to illustrate and expand on learned content, in addition to more traditional learning methods for delivering content.

Expectations:

As one of the chief aims of the government class is to develop responsible, informed, engaged citizens, participation is essential. Come prepared and on-time. Use class time productively when working collaboratively. Projects and other assignments must be turned in at the designated time. If this is ever a problem, or if you ever need help with *anything* in this class, please communicate with me.

Grades:

There are two grading periods for this class (nine weeks each). Grades will be assigned according to the MCS Grading and Grade Point Scale. Below is an approximate breakdown of grades by category for each grading period:
